I give you every liberty to doubt the motives of our Indian leaders—men like Hon. G. K. Gokhale, Surendro Nath Bannerji, or Sir Pherozeshah Mehta, the backbone of the British Government in India. But I am surprised to read in your yesterday's paper that Hindus in Vancouver are helping financially the agitators in India and sending money to buy rifles."

"Two thousand dollars was collected at one Sunday meeting and a draft of \$20,000 is found in London banks from Vancouver," says the report.
