## HINDUS HERE

### RISE TO PROTEST

Cable London, Calcutta, and Wire Ottawa Over One Threatened Deportation.

The most strongly-worded protest ever framed by the Hindus of Vancouver was sent last night to Lord Morley, Lord Minto, Viceroy of India, and to Sir Wilfrid Laurier. It read: "Hindustani Association, Vancouver, B. C., in special meeting, protest against... local Dominion... regarding... the... of Mr. H. Rahim, British subject, respectable Mohammedan merchant, manager Canada-India Trust Company here, holding landed property.

"As British subjects we demand our unalienable right to reside, more freely, in British Empire; request immediate redress against high-handed, impolitic and Empire-breaking action of local authorities.

(Signed) G. D. KUMAR, "Secretary."

The protest followed a special meeting of the Hindus held last night at which the threatened deportation of Mr. Rahim was the one lively topic.

According to the local immigration officials Mr. Rahim arrived from Honolulu as a tourist. By the federal act tourists are exempt from the operation of the conditions of the law. But it is pointed out by the immigration officials that Mr. Rahim did not long continue in this roving role, soon deciding to remain here and engage in business.

This they regard as a violation of the law, and therefore contend that Mr. Rahim is not legally in Canada. He has merely been informed that he is liable to deportation, his case being now before the authorities at Ottawa.

## BROADWAY EAST BRIDGE

Great Northern Will Construct Crossing Over Its Cut at the Point.

City Engineer Clement was this morning notified by Assistant Chief Engineer Stewart of the Great Northern Railway that he was recommending the construction of a bridge over the railway cut at Broadway. A petition for the work was sent forward by the council some time ago as the street is now opened on both sides of the cut. The undertaking will be an expensive one, as Broadway crosses the cut diagonally and the street is ninety-nine feet wide.

## COMMISSION'S REPORT

### IS EXPECTED SOON

University Site May Be Suggested Within Six Weeks' Time.

Victoria, June 29.—The members of the University Site Commission held their final sitting in this province yesterday morning, and in the afternoon took formal leave of Premier McBride, Hon. Dr. Young and Hon. Mr. Bowser, having on Monday evening been the honored guests at a bright and informal reception tendered jointly by the Alexandra and University Women's Club. Each and all of the commissioners speak in terms of glowing appreciation of their introduction to British Columbia and their varied experience at the hands of its hospitable people.

The five commissioners proceed from Vancouver today, by invitation of Principal Murray, to Saskatoon, where it is understood the data collected during their travels will be reviewed, and in all probability the report prepared in which the decision of the commission locating British Columbia's seat of higher education will be communicated to the government. While the report is promised "before Christmas," it is expected that it will be in the hands of the government here within six weeks or two months.

In all their communications with the government, individual ministers and others having business relations with them during their labors, the commissioners have carefully refrained from expressing any opinions which might be taken as indicative of united or individual preferences.

## TRAM WAGE SCHEDULE

New Three-Year Agreement Signed Up Yesterday Afternoon.

The agreement between the B. C. E. R. Co. and its tram employees covering a wage schedule for the ensuing three years was signed yesterday afternoon and will come into force on July 1. As previously stated in these columns the men have been granted practically their entire full demands as to advance of wages in consideration of the abolishment of the profit-sharing system whereby they received an annual bonus. The new wage schedule for motormen and conductors is based on the terms of service of the men, ranging from 22 cents per hour for beginners to 35 cents per hour for five-year men. This means a considerable advance all along the line, although the increases are greatest for the long-term men.

## HOLDUP MEN SENTENCED

Prison Terms Imposed on Principals in Fernie Robberies.

Fernie, June 29.—Judge Wilson, presiding at a special session of the county court here this morning, sentenced Roderic Dunlop to three months in jail for complicity in a street holdup last March and John Kitchener, the other party in the same crime, to two months.

In the case of Fred and John Belanger, found guilty of complicity in the Coal Creek holdup last February, His Honor sentenced Fred Balanger to six months dating from the time of his arrest and John Balanger to two years from the same date. The difference in the length of sentences was on account of the fact that Fred had not participated in the holdup, having only shared in the proceeds, while John was one of the two men who did the actual robbing.

## TOO FEW CLERKS;

## TOO MUCH MAIL

Letters for Upper Country Come Here and Are Then Re-shipped.

Because there are too few mail clerks handling the business on the government mail cars on Canadian Pacific trains in the West, British Columbia people are just now getting a poor service in portions of their Eastern Canadian, American and old country mail.

A train which arrived this morning brought 100 sacks of mail destined for various places in British Columbia from Field west, and which should have been handled east of the British Columbia boundary line. The railway mail clerks are supposed to handle all mail destined for this province before the train reaches Field. Thus a package for that place is put off as the train comes through. But on this occasion, as on several others recently, all the mail is brought to
