My dear Rogers,
The enclosed letter from Mr. Burrell explains clearly
how his letter from Vancouver informed me of
the situation which impaled him in connection
with a settlement of the long boundary dispute.
He was told by Commandant H. G. the "Pacemaker"
that it was necessary to see him
or that no business would be done.
Under the circumstances Mr. Burrell
seems to have made some arrangements for
reimbursement of about £1000. I think
the cause was settled. And your letter
sets up the matter with me.
