MR. COPY OF DIARY

TUESDAY, NOV. 24TH, 1909.
Received advance of \$10.00 from Mr. MacMillan.

WEDNESDAY, NOV. 25TH, 1909.
Left by the 7.40 p.m. train, and arrived at Shimla at 9.15 a.m., had breakfast and found about 18 Hindus working on farms in the vicinity at 11.30 a.m. day. No Indians raised, left station at 10.30 a.m. and arrived at Abbottabad at 10.45. At 11 a.m. the station master told me that there were about 16 Hindus working on construction work for D.G.T.Y. wages \$1.50 a day. Proceeded to the Abbottabad lumber Co. (five miles out) and there was about 20 Hindus at work, wages \$1.75 to \$2.00 a day. The mill will close down on the 2nd, 2nd, 3rd, 4th and 5th April. The manager is Hollister. All Hindus intend returning to Peshawar. Proceeded to Lumsinghat - 2 miles - and found 30 Hindus working on construction work at wages \$1.50 a day. At Abbottabad four Hindus named RAM, BHILAI, TIBBIA & CHINNOO, working on building lot, each respectively got about \$1.50 per day, which they had deposited for rags keeping with a dressmaker named CHAKKAR KHOKH. Main road had gone into liquidation and assigned. Therefore, returning to noisy the assembly. Learned of the Hindu strike. Legal processions were held over night and organized that there were about 20 Hindus working on Farms at Matioli. At Chakburn there were 20 Hindus working for the Chapman processess. Wages ranging at wages \$1.50 per day. No strikes called. Returned to Shimla at 4.30 p.m., and left at 8.15 p.m. for Aggers, and put up at the Villa White Hotel.

THURSDAY, NOV. 26TH, 1909.
Started inquiries at 8 a.m., and found nine Hindus working in a farm here at \$1.20 per day was all found. Learned that there were about 120 Hindus at Ravine Hill, all tramps excepts, so could not leave for Kurnish Hill.

FRIDAY, NOV. 27TH, 1909.
Left Aggers at 10. a.m. on emergency train, and arrived Abbottabad at 11 a.m., started inquiries and found that there were 20 Hindus working for the British lumber company, wages \$1.50 per day. The mills have shut down to-day, and the Hindus discharged, the mills will re-open again in the Spring. All Hindus are springing for money, and are provided with funds. There are no cases of starvation or death to-day. It is raining very hard, windsale and landslides are observed all over the place. Instead leaving for Gullistan by this evening's train, left Morichah Hills at 6.p.m., and arrived Chilas 7 p.m., put up at the Royal Hotel.
