COPY OF DIARY

Saturday, December 4th, 1909.

Left Vancouver at 7:30 a.m., and arrived at Revelstoke midday. Put up at the C.P.R. Hotel.

Sunday, December 5th, 1909.

Left the Hotel at 12 noon and proceeded to the city. All places of business being closed could not ascertain the whereabouts of Hingoo. Called on the Chief of Police and learned that there were about 80 Hindus in the City employed by the Bowes Logging Co. of the C.P.R. There were no difficulties in securing them, although a few were out of work. Returned to the Hotel at 1 p.m.

Monday, December 6th, 1909.

Left the Hotel at 8 a.m., and proceeded to the C.P.R. Station and found 16 Hindus working at the Coal Chipping and around the Yard. Payed 1.50 day. Visited Hirji Lal - an educated Singh - I learned that he was aware of the case against Mr. Martin and had been engaged by him to drive his car on the Arrow lakes. He stated that he instructed Messrs. Briggs & Scott, Barristers of this City, to take legal proceedings against a Mr. F.C. Martin for the recovery of damages for causing him to lose two Hindus recently employed. That Mr. Martin had sent over the sum of \$100.00 through his solicitors, Mr. Macmillan & Son of Kamloops, B.C. and that after the damages and Connor's expenses had been deducted as well as the Solicitor's fee, the sum of \$25. had been sent down to the two Hindus in Vancouver. Mr. Briggs of the firm of Briggs & Scott, confirm'd the statement, and stated that the whole affair was an accident, for which Mr. Martin had been partially responsible. He further stated that he had been engaged by the Arrow Timber Company and found 22 Hindus working in the mill at \$1.50 per day. One Hindu named Bhola Singh left today for Vancouver, en route to India, and left the purchase of his steamer ticket at the local office. At the advice of an acquaintance, Mr. Bhola Singh working for the L.R. Lumber Co. on five of their ships - Dabu Jumla, Bushwacker, Lal Singh, Assoot Singh and Ravi Singh that a Hindu named Heron Singh employed as foreman by the C.P.R. was leaving Blackball on one of these to the extent of \$1, a month, for securing them their present passage. He would like to speak English hence their inability to bring the matter before the authorities. I wrote Mr. Macmillan on this matter and will if I may bring the matter to the notice of the Divisional Dept. Between to the Hotel at 8 p.m.

Tuesday, December 7th, 1909.

Left Revelstoke at 10 a.m., and arrived at Invermere at noon, where there are still one Baker Mill in operation and which was to close down at the end of the week, and two Hindu out of work, another mill at this place had burnt down a short time ago, and put 20 Hindus out of work. Those had gone down to Vancouver. Visited the Steamer for West Kootenay en route to Kamloops. From the officers of this boat I learned that shooting took place on the s.s. "Kootenay".
