Sir:-

I beg to report that ~~on~~ ^{on Friday last} in the possession of Mr. McGill, a man named ~~Swak~~ ^{Swak} was found in the United States newspaper office he said he had extracted from Mr. D. Durr's room, and it is evident from the circulation by him of these papers that millions of copies are received by them and circulated by him. It also informs us that Durr's paper, "The Hindustani" contains articles taken out from the papers unreported, and circulated among the Hindus.

On the perusal of these papers it can be seen that the names and addresses found in Durr's note look very close to the publishers of these different newspapers. I have noted in the papers the dates of my letters pertaining to my particular statement made therein and of which I have advised you previously.

I am informed by different Hindus that a man named Guttman (or Guttmanberg) is visiting extensively in circles among them, but the nature of the ~~circles~~ ^{circles} I have not been able to learn as yet. For the first time ~~there~~ ^{they} held a meeting from religious point of view, at which some twenty or thirty Hindus were present, and in the course of the deliberations he advised these Hindus
