Sir,

I beg to state that I have cited you, as follows: -

Suren M. Bose Bangali (alias) applied for admission via this dock. He had been in Canada since the month of December 1907, and worked in Canada, before he came to the United States. Admission refused under section 3 of the Act, and 92A. Will apply to be admitted by the Bureau here as tourist to lecture here and visit in an inviting manner and assisting of India. Conditions to be made under and those of the Act.

In connection with this case I beg to report that on 11th March this morning Inspector J. C. Dettie from this dock brought up this Bangali Suren M. Bose for examination. I met him at the Station and there interrogated this man and learnt from him that he had landed in Vancouver about the month of December 1907; that he spent four or five weeks in Vancouver and then went into the United States where he pursued studies in different colleges and for the last year had been lecturing in India. I told him that he was not admissible as he had no Canadian domicile and under the present act only people who had had three years previous residence could be admitted to Canada, and in his case if he now applied for permission, it would be necessary to conform to the Act, and 92A, - and I further told him that I had refused his admission under section 3 of the Immigration Act, giving him at the same time an outline of the contents of the
